OUR FOUNDATION

Philosophy

Word of Life Bible Institute as an educational institution has developed its entire program around a particular philosophy of education. This philosophy of education is based on three key words: Know (study), Grow (life), and Show (ministry). These three words characterize our approach to education.

Believers are commanded to study the Word of God, accepting it as their foundation and authority.

Since discipleship and character building are the responsibility of godly leadership, we need to build an institution that will educate students in Biblical doctrine and conduct, through the classroom and lifestyle of our staff. Our goal is to produce students that practice excellence in the Christian life, bringing glory to God.

Principles

A. 2 Timothy 2:15

We believe that the Bible is not only the foundation for morality, but it is also authoritative in every area that it addresses. It is, therefore, the beginning of wisdom and a prerequisite for any academic endeavor.

B. Colossians 2:6-7

We believe that any area of Bible study must be built on a proper relationship with Jesus Christ.

C. 2 Timothy 2:1-2

We believe that intellectual "knowing" is only a beginning step and that a student has not learned until he has put this knowledge into practice.

D. Colossians 1:9-11, 2:8-9; Titus 2:7-8

We believe that character development is a legitimate concern of education.

E. Ezra 7:10; 1 Corinthians 4:15-16; Matthew 28:19-20

We believe that staff and faculty are more than teachers. They are role models and, as such, must display Christian character and commitment before the student.

F. 2 Timothy 3:16; Titus 2:1

We believe that doctrine is the foundation for all our endeavors.

Mission Statement

The mission of Word of Life Bible Institute is to educate each student within a rigorous academic and structured discipleship atmosphere preparing him or her to live a life of maximum effectiveness for the Lord.

Objectives

1. Academic Objectives (Study)

The Bible Institute offers only Bible and Bible-related courses in its standard two-year curriculum and in its electives which are designed for those able to handle additional academic work. We seek to instill within students a practical working knowledge of the Bible that will enable them to articulate and defend a Biblical worldview. The specific objectives of the academic program are to provide students with:

- a. An understanding of the context, content and contribution of every book of the Bible.
- b. An understanding of all the basic doctrines of orthodox Christianity.
- c. An in-depth understanding of the major books of the Bible.
- d. Particular ministry skills in evangelism, discipleship, Bible study methodology, leadership, counseling, and Biblical communication courses. These are taught by a dynamic combination of both resident and adjunct faculty who have distinguished themselves in their fields of expertise.

Courses are structured to meet high academic standards and are recognized by most Bible colleges so that students may achieve their degree (Bachelor's or Associate's in Bible) from that Institution without interruption.

The above objectives are the specific focus of the Academic Department.

2. Spiritual Objectives (Life)

In addition to the study of the Bible, the Bible Institute seeks to develop students' character and life skills outside the classroom. Programs designed to enhance personal spiritual growth are an important part of the Bible Institute experience. Our specific objectives are to help every student to:

- a. Develop a habit of daily devotional time in the Scriptures.
- b. Pursue personal godly character and corporate Biblical community.
- c. Apply Biblical principles of physical, emotional, and social wholeness to daily life. A team of godly, compassionate men and women provide instruction, encouragement, and counsel in both formal and informal settings, helping students to deepen their relationship with the Lord and to demonstrate a loving concern for others.

The above objectives are the specific focus of the Student Life Department.

3. Functional Objectives (Ministry)

Whether the Lord leads a student to the mission field, the ministry, a trade, a business, a profession, or any other field of endeavor, in the light of eternity, the most important issue is how effective that person is for the Lord. Effectiveness in Christian service is measured by the influence that is exerted in the lives of others to lead them to Christ or to help them toward spiritual maturity. Therefore, the Bible Institute seeks to nurture within students a passion for Christian ministry and to equip them to impact today's society for Christ by involving them in meaningful ministry to others. Our specific objectives are to give every student the opportunity to:

- a. Share the gospel with someone and/or counsel them to trust Christ as their Savior.
- b. Use their natural abilities and their spiritual gifts in service to others.
- c. Gain first-hand experience in missions.

The above objectives are the specific focus of the Ministries Department.

Program

Word of Life Bible Institute is a two-year, non-degree granting institution whose high academic standards are recognized by most Christian colleges. The emphasis of the first year is Biblical Foundation and it is offered at several locations around the world. The emphasis of the second year is Ministry Foundation and it is offered at the main campus located

in Pottersville, NY. Students who complete the first year receive a Bible Certificate. A diploma is awarded for the successful completion of both years of the program. Each year is comprised of two academic semesters followed by a Ministry Practicum (1st Year) and a Ministry Internship (2nd year).

Word of Life Bible Institute is accredited by the Transnational Association of Christian Colleges and Schools (TRACS) which is an accrediting agency for Christian post-secondary education that is recognized by the United States Department of Education (USDE). Word of Life Bible Institute is listed in the Accredited Institutions of Postsecondary Education Directory.

Statement of Faith

1. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are verbally inspired of God, and they are without error in the original writings, and they are the supreme and final authority for faith and life.
2. We believe in one God, Creator and Sustainer of the universe, Who is eternally existent in three persons –Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.
3. We believe in the Deity of Jesus Christ; His virgin birth; sinless life; His death to pay the penalty for our sins; His bodily resurrection; His exaltation to God's right hand; and His personal, imminent, pretribulational and premillennial return.
4. We believe that all men have sinned, and therefore, guilty before God and are under His condemnation.
5. We believe that all who by faith receive Jesus Christ are then born again of the Holy Spirit, therefore, children of God and eternally saved, and that the Holy Spirit dwells within every believer to enlighten, guide, and enable the believer in life, testimony, and service. We believe that God answers the prayers of His people and meets their needs according to His purpose.
6. We believe that God gives spiritual gifts to all believers for the building up of the Body of Christ. However, the miraculous sign-gifts of the Spirit, such as tongues and healings, were limited to the early church.
7. We believe in the bodily resurrection of the just and unjust, the everlasting blessedness of the saved in Glory, and the everlasting conscious punishment of the lost in hell.
8. We believe that all believers are called to a life of separation from all worldly and sinful practices and alliances.
9. We believe that from the beginning with Adam and Eve, God ordained marriage as only between a man and a woman. All sexual activity outside of marriage, including homosexual practices, is in direct contradiction to God's Word and His institution of the home.

A Statement on the Historicity of Genesis

Word of Life Bible Institute is committed to the historical and factual accuracy of the Book of Genesis. Therefore, we teach a recent creation of the entire universe and all forms of life in the six, 24-hour days of the creation week. We believe that Adam and Eve were the first man and woman and that all of mankind has descended from them and has inherited a sin nature from their fall into sin, resulting in a cursed creation. We believe in a personal Satan who led some of the angels to rebel, enticed Eve to eat the forbidden fruit, and continues to oppose God's program for human history. We believe in a worldwide flood which explains the disappearance of certain species recorded in the fossil record, the subsequent development of mankind from Noah, and the creation of language groups and nations from God's intervention at the Tower of Babel. We believe that Satan's attempt to overthrow God is doomed to fail and that the Lake of Fire has been prepared as a place of eternal conscious punishment for him, his demons, and all humans who reject Christ.

Standard of Conduct

1. Word of Life Fellowship, Inc., including domestic and foreign affiliations under the Word of Life structure, is dedicated to the Lordship of Christ in all areas of life. The distinctives of Word of Life lay in its philosophy and goals. The Word of Life family is a community of a board of directors, staff members and students (hereafter referred to as

“associates”). Each associate consequently bears certain responsibilities and obligations within the organization for the implementation of its philosophy and goals. In order that the organization functions efficiently and its goals be realized, it is necessary that there be a mutual commitment to a corpus of standards which involve the willing surrender of certain individual purposes and goals.

2. Word of Life follows specific Biblical principles, which relate to Christian behavior. Therefore, Word of Life prohibits practices, which are clearly forbidden by the Word of God, such as drunkenness, sexual immorality, dishonesty, and the like (I Corinthians 6:9-20). Further, to expect associates to exemplify Christian love, consideration for the rights of others, honesty, and a high sense of Christian ethics is to expect only that which the Word of God teaches to be primary in the character of the Christian (Ephesians 4:24-5:8).

3. Word of Life is firmly committed to a literal interpretation of the Bible and rejects any attempt to “reinterpret” Scripture in light of “modern” moral or psychological theories. In the Biblical account of creation, the family was the first societal institution ordained by God (Genesis 1:27, 2:18-22). Furthermore, Scripture plainly declares that the first two humans created by God were a man and a woman (Genesis 1:27, 2:18-22). God joined the man and woman in the holy rite of matrimony and commanded them to be fruitful, multiply, and replenish the earth (Genesis 1:28). Therefore, the only legitimate marriage is the joining of one man and one woman (Genesis 2:24, Romans 7:2, I Corinthians 7:10, Ephesians 5:22-23).

In both the Old and New Testaments, God has commanded that no intimate sexual activity should take place outside of a marriage between a man and a woman. Accordingly, all forms of homosexuality, lesbianism, bisexuality, bestiality, incest, fornication, adultery, and pornography are sinful perversions of God’s gift of sex (Genesis 2:24, 19:5, 13, 26:8-9, Leviticus 13:22, 18:1-30, Romans 1:26-29, I Corinthians 5:1, 6:9, I Thessalonians 4:1-8, Hebrews 13:4).

Since Word of Life believes that all sexual activity outside of a marriage, including homosexual practices, are in direct opposition to God’s Word and constitute a direct contradiction to God’s institution of the home, Word of Life will not employ or continue to employ men or women who promote or participate in homosexual behavior or any other sexual activity outside of marriage.

4. Word of Life recognizes the principles of Christian liberty within the sphere of those things, which are intrinsically innocent. However, Word of Life also recognizes that liberty needs to be restricted in certain instances. Scriptural precedent is found in Acts 15 and Romans 14, where certain practices inherently innocent were forbidden because they could do spiritual harm to other members of the Christian community.

Verses for reference include:

- 1 Corinthians 6:12 - Lawful, but not expedient (not profitable for our good)
- 1 Corinthians 10:23 - Lawful, but not edifying
- 1 Corinthians 8:9 - Could be a stumbling block
- Romans 1:32 - Christians are different, and by living like the world, we approve of it. There should be no pleasure in watching sin.
- Ephesians 5:6-7, 11 - Don’t be deceived with vanity and participate in it.
- Colossians 3:17 - Make sure it pleases the Lord, not the emotions - flesh or self.
- Hebrews 12:1-2 - Lay aside weights as well as the sin.

5. Certain principles of conduct are a necessary part of the effort to establish an atmosphere within which the goals of Word of Life can be realized. For this reason and in an effort to maintain a consistent and above-reproach testimony to youth, Word of Life requires associates to refrain from the possession or use of alcoholic beverages, all smoking products, recreational and illicit drugs, from gambling, and from social dancing. Ceremonial dancing at special family events such as weddings and anniversaries is permitted. Biblical discretion and restraint will be exercised in all choices of entertainment, including radio, television, all forms of audio and visual recordings, movies, stage productions, computer and video gaming, various forms of literature and social media (Psalm 101:3, Romans 14:13-17, I Corinthians 9:22-23, I Corinthians 10:31, 2 Corinthians 6:3, Philippians 4:8, Ephesians 5:3-4, I Timothy 4:12, Titus 2:12). Furthermore, it is expected that associates will actively support a local Bible-believing church through service, giving, and allegiance (Hebrews 10:24-25).

6. Word of Life rejects the principle that exposure to and/or experimentation with doubtful and objectionable practices is essential to the development of moral or intellectual discernment and/or discrimination. Word of Life reserves the right to make the final decision in any questionable area.

7. Word of Life recognizes that observance of Word of Life standards does not comprise the whole of an individual's responsibility to God and hence does not necessarily indicate that one is living a life of full commitment. The philosophy of Word of Life, however, maintains that willingness to obey these standards shows a maturity and spiritual concern for the whole Christian community (Galatians 5:13-24).

8. Conduct that is an offense to good taste, sound morality, or Christian propriety will not be acceptable. While some may not have personal convictions wholly in accordance with Word of Life standards, the purpose underlying them necessitates the honorable obedience to them. If an individual can no longer in integrity conform to them, that person should withdraw from Word of Life. Willful disobedience of these standards will bring about dismissal from Word of Life immediately.

9. To insure that the doctrinal position of Word of Life will be maintained in an uncompromising manner and believing that a consistent and exemplary life should be expected of those who undertake the instruction and guidance of Christian youth, it is required that those associated with the organization shall individually affirm by signing the following at the time of initial association and shall so reaffirm at such time as determined by Word of Life.

ADMISSIONS

Admissions Requirements

1. Each applicant must be at least 17 years of age at the time of registration.
2. Since the Bible Institute is a postsecondary Institute, each applicant must be a high school graduate, have obtained a GED or have met the requirements of New York State (or their state) regarding High School completion.
3. Transcripts are required for all secondary and postsecondary education.
4. Each applicant must be in agreement with Word of Life's Statement of Faith and signify a willingness to abide by its Standard of Conduct.
5. Each applicant must give testimony to being born again and indicate a sincere desire to study the Word of God.
6. It is recommended that each student take either the ACT or SAT test and have the results sent to the Admissions Office at Word of Life Bible Institute. The ACT scores are preferred. The ACT School Code is 2991; the SAT School Code is 7974.

Note: Once a student has been accepted to Word of Life Bible Institute or one of its teaching sites, transfer of that acceptance to another teaching site must be approved through the Word of Life Bible Institute Admissions Office.

Ability to Benefit

It is in a student's best interest to receive either a high school diploma or its equivalent before beginning college work. However, there is another process by which your ability to benefit can be determined.

Students who do not possess a high school diploma or who have not passed the General Education Development tests are required to demonstrate the ability to benefit from the programs offered at Word of Life Bible Institute. Students must demonstrate the ability to benefit by the following methods:

Option 1

Successful completion of a training program in the United States Armed Forces.

Option 2

Successful completion of at least 15 credit hours at an accredited institution of higher education with an accumulative GPA of at least a 2.0 on a four-point scale.

Notice of Nondiscriminatory

Policy as to Students

The Word of Life Bible Institute admits students of any sex, race, color, or national and ethnic origin to all the rights, privileges, programs, and activities generally accorded or made available to students at the Institute. It does not

discriminate on the basis of sex, race, color, or national and ethnic origin in its educational policies, admissions policies, scholarship and loan programs, or athletic and other school-administered programs.

International Student Admissions

Due to difficulties that often arise, international students are advised to make early contact with the Admissions Department. Please note that all documents must be translated into U.S. English. Applicants are advised to adhere to the following procedures:

1. Complete and return the application, autobiography, and two reference forms.
2. Each applicant must be able to read, write and communicate in English. If English is not your first language you must pass the TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language) with a 61 or better on the internet based test. Students who have attended one of Word of Life's SYME programs must pass the MPT (Michigan Placement Test) with a score of 81 (with 4 months completed), 71 (with 6 months completed) or 61 (with 8 months completed) to attend. Students should submit TOEFL scores to Word of Life Bible Institute using our TOEFL Code 3955.
3. Submit high school and any postsecondary transcripts.
4. Obtain and complete a Financial Support Declaration. Return to the Admissions office, ATTN: International Student Advisor.

Transferring into Word of Life Bible Institute

Word of Life Bible Institute will consider for transfer coursework completed at accredited institutions of postsecondary education whose accrediting agencies are recognized by the U.S. Department of Education. Only coursework completed at a C average or better will be considered for transfer after a review by the Academic Dean. Students need to provide a transcript for all accredited coursework taken and indicate a desire to transfer coursework before enrolling in the current semester. Coursework earned at a non-accredited institution may be submitted for review with an official transcript and course descriptions. Coursework earned at non-accredited institutions will be considered on a case by case basis by the Academic Dean. In most cases, refusal to transfer work will be based on content or academic standards incompatible with the courses required for graduation at Word of Life Bible Institute.

Since Word of Life Bible Institute offers a unified curriculum in each of the 4 academic semesters and exists as a discipleship program requiring that all resident students maintain a full load of coursework each semester, students may transfer in only the number of courses that would enable them to maintain a full load, substituting the transferred courses with electives or video coursework. Students may also transfer in an entire semester's worth of coursework or an entire year's worth of coursework once the coursework has been evaluated by the Academic Dean. Graduates of the Word of Life Bible Institute must complete 50% of the work towards graduation at Word of Life Bible Institute.

Transferring to Other Schools

Depending on the anticipated course of study and academic record, up to two years of credit is granted by most Christian colleges. Among the schools that have granted credit for coursework completed at Word of Life are the following:

Appalachian Bible College, Clarks Summit University (formerly Baptist Bible College), Cairn University, Calvary Bible College, Cedarville University, Christian Heritage College, Davis College, Grace College, Cornerstone University, Lancaster Bible College, Liberty University, Moody Bible Institute, Pensacola Christian College, Piedmont International University, Southeastern College at Wake Forest, The Masters College, Washington Bible College and many others. Scholarships are often offered by many of these schools to Word of Life Bible Institute graduates.

* Fees for second year students do not include the cost of books. Fees for first year students include a Logos Bible Software package which contains many of the required textbooks. Class notes are delivered via the campus intranet in Microsoft Word format optimized for use with Logos. Students are expected to bring tablets/laptops with Microsoft Word to class for note-taking purposes. These must have a battery life exceeding five hours since class size does not allow for power outlets. Please visit our website (www.wordoflife.edu/logos) for further information and a list of recommended computers. Some students may incur additional fees due to participation in specialty ministry programs. All prices are subject to change without notice.

Payment Schedule

Word of Life Bible Institute bills students on the basis of 2 semesters. The fall semester is billed in July and the spring semester is billed in December. Payments for the fall and spring semesters are due and payable when the bill is received. Payment plans are available; please contact the Business Office for details. Students may use credit/debit cards (VISA, Master Card or Discover) to pay their school bills.

Financial Aid

Each teaching has its own financial aid offerings based on their unique context. Please refer to the addendums at the end of the catalog for the particular financial aid offerings.

The New York and Florida teaching sites participate in Federal Title IV financial aid programs and are eligible to process Pell Grants, Stafford Loans, Plus Loans, Federal Work Study and FSEOG federal assistance programs. The Title IV school code is 011859.

The following scholarships are available for students who have participated in the Word of Life Club program: ENGAGE, Teens Involved International (TI), Cre8ive Discipleship (C-8). Also, qualified students who have worked at a Word of Life Camp can apply for the Crew/Summer Training Corps (STC) Scholarship. Many other scholarships are also available. Interested students should contact the Bible Institute Financial Aid Office for more information. Information concerning additional scholarships, financial aid information, and applications are available online at www.wordoflife.edu.

Word of Life Bible Institute offers several scholarships each year to students who demonstrate spiritual maturity and leadership abilities. These scholarships are for the position of student leadership. Student Leaders are responsible for overseeing student life in the dorms, for enforcing standards and regulations, for supervising specific work assignments, and for assuming other leadership roles associated with campus life.

Scholarship funds are also made available for dependent children of parents who are full-time pastors or missionaries.

Word of Life Bible Institute is also approved for the training of Veterans and dependents of disabled Veterans in the US. Word of Life is eligible to participate in the Post-911 program.

Each student is expected to have completed arrangements necessary to meet any and all financial obligations by registration. Diplomas and final transcripts are not issued until all financial obligations have been met. Standards for academic progress must be maintained to be eligible for all Federal, Veteran's and institutional aid programs.

Refunds

If a student withdraws or is dismissed from school, refunds will be granted on the following basis:

After the sixth week.....No refund except board.
Board refunds will be granted on the actual number of weeks remaining in the semester after week 6.
Federal/State grants and loans will be refunded according to current Federal/State regulations.
Students receiving Veteran's benefits will be contacted by the VA in the event the VA is due a refund.

Dismissal

The student handbook is available online at www.wordoflife.edu and provided for all students when they register. This handbook supplies additional information concerning all areas of life at the Bible Institute. Any student who cannot cheerfully abide by these would be expected to withdraw from the school. Academic dismissal may occur when a student's GPA is less than 1.00 during the first semester of attendance, 1.50 during the second semester, or less than 2.00 cumulative GPA to continue into the second year. Exceptions to this policy may be made by petition to the Academic Dean.

Recognition

1. Word of Life Bible Institute is accredited by the Transnational Association of Christian Colleges and Schools, an institutional accrediting body. TRACS can be contacted at 15935 Forest Rd, Forest, VA 24551, or by phone at (434) 525-9539, www.tracs.org.
2. The New York State Education Department approves Word of Life Bible Institute for operation in New York State.
3. Word of Life Bible Institute is authorized under Federal law to enroll nonimmigrant alien students.
4. The New York State Education Department approves Word of Life Bible Institute for the training of veterans.
5. Transfer to other schools: Depending upon the anticipated course of study and academic record, two years of credit are normally granted by most Christian colleges for those students completing two years at Word of Life Bible Institute.

Facilities

Classrooms

In New York, first-year classes are held in the Jack Wyrzten Center, a 1,200-seat auditorium. Second-year classes are held in Council Hall, a 600-seat auditorium. In Florida, students meet in the George Theis Assembly Center, located on the Youth Camp property.

Libraries

In New York, the Charles C. Ryrie Library houses over 30,000 volumes. In Florida, the Lehman Strauss Library houses over 15,000 volumes. Students have access to Bible commentaries, resources and theological works, biographies, devotional, and Christian life books. Audio and video recordings of classes are also available for students.

New York Campus

The New York main campus is situated in the heart of the Adirondack Mountains. Its 270 acres stretch northward along the western shore of Schroon Lake, offering panoramic views of God's creation at every turn. Montreal, Quebec is 120 miles north, while Albany, the state capital, lies just 77 miles due south. The colorful Lake Placid Olympic Village, historic Fort Ticonderoga, and many ski resorts are also within easy driving distance. The campus is easily accessible by car or bus via the Adirondack Northway (Interstate 87) which runs north and south within one mile of the school, and by plane at the Albany International Airport.

STUDENT LIFE

Student Life Department

Purpose Statement

The Student Life Department exists to provide the leadership and atmosphere so that each student can be Biblically disciplined and encouraged to “bear fruit” (Gal. 5:22-24) in their relationship with one another and with Christ.

Staff Interaction

Word of Life Bible Institute strives to maintain a close relationship between students and staff. Many members of Word of Life Fellowship’s staff are involved in discipling students during the school year. Staff members encourage students as they grow in their personal devotions, discuss things they are learning in class, and challenge them in areas where the student may be struggling. Students have ready access to any staff or faculty member and are encouraged to seek help and counsel for spiritual, academic, or personal problems.

Study Hours

For students needing extra help with academics, required study hours are held Monday through Thursday evenings from 7-9.

Student Leadership

Every year a number of students are selected to participate in the leadership of our campus. The two primary positions of leadership are Dorm Resident Assistants and Service Resident Assistants. Students are selected based on their leadership ability and character and contribute in a major way to the development of our student body. Student leaders also receive a scholarship.

Student Activities

Bringing together Bible knowledge and practical application of that truth is a key component of the Student Life Department. Each semester the Student Events Coordinator organizes a variety of social activities to give students a fun way to get to know other students and to implement in a practical way what they are learning in the classroom. Some of these events include coffee houses, paintball, skiing, snowboarding, hiking, talent shows, sports tournaments, as well as many other events and activities.

Casual Sports and Intramurals

A variety of sports opportunities exist at Word of Life both in both casual and intramural settings including football, soccer, ultimate Frisbee, volleyball, basketball, and table tennis.

Student Council

Student Council is a group of students who represent and serve the entire student body. Second year Student Council members will be selected for leadership positions and will serve in these positions as their service assignment.

Health Center

On-campus health care is provided by a registered nurse or an emergency medical technician during hours of operation. After hours, students may contact campus first aid or 911 in the event of medical emergencies. Our facilities are located near off campus walk-in and emergency-care facilities. Doctor's appointments at one of our area medical centers may be scheduled through our Health Center.

Worship

There are a variety of means, in addition to the classroom, for students to grow in their walk with God. The Student Life Department is responsible for developing chapel services, Sunday morning worship, and Sunday evening Bible studies where the Word of God is taught in a passionate and dynamic way.

*Missions Conference**

At the end of the fall semester, several days are devoted to a special emphasis on missionary service. These days provide vital information for students considering missions and often dramatically change the direction of many lives.

Founder's Conference - NY*

A highlight of the spring semester is the Bible conference where gifted conference speakers minister the Word, meeting the spiritual needs of the Bible Institute family.

MINISTRY

Ministries Department

Purpose Statement

The Ministries Department is to provide training and opportunity for each student to participate in multiple, meaningful ministry opportunities that have the potential to significantly impact the lives of others.

Ministry Philosophy

Completing the education process at Word of Life Bible Institute are the ministry opportunities which combine the students' knowledge of Scripture and their own personal Christian life to influence the lives of others. Through various means, we provide opportunities for students to work out their faith as Christ would have them to do. Just as evangelism was very close to the heart of Jesus, it is very much an important part of the ministry of Word of Life. The students are not just taught principles of God's Word, but they also learn how to apply these principles in everyday life through specific ministries.

First-Year Students

We take a very strategic approach with our first-year students to provide them with classroom learning and hands-on ministry opportunities. Every first-year student will learn from a classroom setting how to personally share their faith one on one. We will provide a 10 hour accredited course on how to take everyday conversations and direct them towards spiritual matters, ultimately culminating in the sharing of the Gospel. Each student will then be given opportunities to make it practical as we take them to heavily populated areas, send them on youth activities and retreats, and provide opportunities to serve and interact through various service outreaches.

Second-Year Students - NY

Because the emphasis of the second year of our program is ministry foundation, we provide many more opportunities for students to develop and strengthen their God-given gifts and abilities. Through children's ministry, sports, drama, music, online ministries, consistent weekly local church involvement, or ministries that students create themselves, we believe that students are provided with a wide range of opportunities that will best prepare them for future service.

Sample Ministry Opportunities

Note: Ministry offerings vary at teaching sites.

Snow Camp - NY

Each weekend during the winter, Word of Life Bible Institute hosts up to 430 young people at our New York campus and 100 at our Canadian campus for Snow Camp. Many students have the opportunity to apply their classroom knowledge to practical experience as camp counselors. The students will be involved in every aspect of running the camp: from counseling, to working on maintenance, to running the program. Those at the Florida teaching site will counsel in the winter camping program there.

Praise Teams

We have several opportunities across our teaching sites for students to audition for our praise teams. These teams will lead corporate worship during campus services and in local churches and various youth events. We are looking for students who play the guitar, drums, keyboard, etc.

Collegians – NY

The Word of Life Collegian Choir is an elective that allows students from multiple ministry groups an opportunity to participate and receive transferable coursework. The Collegians rehearse for 2 hours each week and have several

opportunities throughout the year to minister to students and guests. Knowledge of music is good, but it is not absolutely necessary; however, it is necessary to possess some musical talent. Auditions for Collegians take place the first week of school.

Voices of Victory - NY

Voices of Victory is a mixed vocal ensemble offering a varied repertoire which requires strong vocal ability and instrumental talent. Voices of Victory members rehearse 2-3 hours per week and minister in campus events as well as travel periodically to minister in schools and churches around New England. They also minister on the Magi tour, our traveling Christmas production. Students in Voices of Victory will fulfill their Ministry Practicum at the Word of Life Island teen camp. They may also travel to other Christian camps as part of their practicum. Voices of Victory members are required to fulfill the entire eight weeks of Ministry Practicum with Word of Life and then sing at graduation. Auditions for Voices of Victory take place the first week of school.

Sports Ministry - NY

The sports ministry has an incredible opportunity for discipleship and evangelism through the avenue of sports. This ministry is available for those students who have special abilities in the area of athletics.

Tryouts are necessary to select the students who will form the teams that represent Word of Life Bible Institute.

Sports offered:

Drama

This program allows students to use their dramatic abilities to minister in churches, Christian schools, and elsewhere. Students must try out during the first week of school. The drama teams practice at least once a week. Performances include both short skits and more specialized, longer presentations regarding salvation and dedication. The purchase of an outfit is required.

Ministry Teams

Students on Ministry Teams will assist in various ministry outreaches and events both on and off campus, primarily focusing on teen ministry. In addition, students provide support to other organizations or businesses in the community and on campus.

Church Support Ministry

Opportunities to work within the local church are available. This program is run as a ministry of a local church and gives opportunities to work with both saved and unsaved boys and girls.

Open Air Evangelism

Training in street evangelism is offered under the supervision of Word of Life's Open Air Evangelism Ministry. Students spend time in urban areas such as New York City, Tampa, or Toronto, learning to be a witness to children and adults.

Spanish Ministry - NY

Students on these teams will partner with Spanish youth ministries of New York City. They will be scheduled for one trip of ministry and will also be required to attend a training session before they leave.

Prison Ministry – NY (Men Only)

This ministry provides opportunities to work within the prison system teaching Bible studies and holding in-prison seminars. This ministry takes place during the week and is only available to men.

Albany Medical Center (Girls Only) - NY

While serving on the AMC team, students will have the unique opportunity to interact with children staying at the Albany Medical Center. This team will be responsible to plan activities and crafts for the children. Students will also have the opportunity to serve at the Ronald McDonald House to be a testimony to the families and employees working there.

Public School Release Time - NY

Release Time is an established after-school ministry in the Schroon Lake Central School. Each week teams will have the opportunity to lead games and songs, teach a lesson, or help review the memory verse.

Rescue Mission Ministry (Men Only) - NY

The Capital City Rescue Mission of Albany NY will provide teams with the opportunity to serve through a work project, leading chapel services, and serving the guests' dinner.

Open Door Soup Kitchen - NY

This team will travel every other Monday to serve meals and interact with those in need in the Glens Falls area.

Service Assignments

Every student while in attendance at the Bible Institute will receive a service assignment which runs 6-8 hours per week. Students serve in a variety of areas such as food service, maintenance, and office work. One of our goals at the Bible Institute is to provide opportunities for application of the Biblical truths being taught in the classroom. Jesus emphasized being a servant to all in His ministry here on earth. Service assignments help instill that same heart of service in each student. Service assignments are included within the overall academic component of the Bible Institute program and comprise a portion of the Christian Disciplines grade.

ACADEMICS

Academic Department

Purpose Statement

The Academic Department seeks to train each student within a rigorous academic atmosphere to maximize the student's effectiveness for the Lord by the practical discernment of Biblical truth.

Introduction

A refreshing exposure to a diversity of teaching styles and ministry philosophies makes the Word of Life Bible Institute experience unique. Resident faculty members teach Bible Survey and Theology the entire first year, providing a unified overview of the 66 books of the Bible and the principal doctrines of the Christian faith. Adjunct faculty provide an interesting counterpoint as they exegete books of the Bible, teaching from their perspectives as pastors, missionaries, evangelists, college presidents, or college and seminary professors.

Course of Study

Word of Life Bible Institute offers a 24-month course of study in New York. A diploma is awarded for the successful completion of two years, each of which is comprised of two academic semesters and one term of practical ministry emphasis. Students who complete the first year are recognized with a Bible certificate and are eligible to continue to the second year of the program. Students who finish the first year with under a 2.0 will be awarded a certificate of attendance.

Grades can be viewed online with the appropriate password. All grades issued at the end of the semester are final and are placed on the student's transcript. When grades are computed, a student may be placed in one of several classifications depending upon their grade point average: Dean's Honor List (3.50 or above), Dean's List (3.00 – 3.49), Academic Probation (2.00 or below), and Academic Discipline (below 1.50 at end of first semester to below 2.00 by middle of second academic semester). Details of Academic Probation, Discipline, or Dismissal are found in the Academic Handbook. There is limited academic assistance offered for students with academic struggles: group tutoring, peer tutoring, study skills seminars, and academic advising. Students may contact the Academic Dean for further information regarding these programs. Students are involved in a full schedule of classes, a six to eight hour/week work program, chapel services, a personal quiet time, and weekly ministries. The schedule normally provides for morning classes. Afternoons are occupied with work assignments, physical education classes, and free time. Saturdays and Sundays are occasionally devoted to special seminars and practical experience in various ministry areas. Special emphasis is given to expose each student to many different ministry opportunities. Evening electives are offered during each academic semester.

Graduation Requirements

Students must:

1. Complete one year of the core curriculum with a cumulative grade point average of 2.0 or higher to receive a Bible certificate. Students who complete two years of the core curriculum with a grade point average of 2.0 or higher will receive a diploma.
2. Successfully complete the Ministry Practicum (1st year) and Ministry Internship (2nd year) requirements.
3. Be in agreement with the Word of Life Statement of Faith.

Students will be allowed to participate in commencement exercises but will not receive their awards or transcripts until all financial obligations have been met in full. Those meeting all of the requirements of the first year, but with a cumulative average of less than 2.0, receive a Certificate of Attendance. Students can begin their training in either September (first semester) or January (second semester).

Bible Exposition

Students receive dynamic training in the classroom from an impressive list of Bible scholars who make the Scriptures come alive. Understanding God's Word is the first step to becoming effective leaders for Christ. These courses are taught by adjunct faculty in one-week or two-week modules. This unique approach provides a highly qualified and versatile faculty. Ten class lectures are devoted each week to a specific module. Final exams for that module are given at the beginning of the following week. In most cases these lectureships are averaged into the larger courses in the chart above (for example: Hebrews, James, and 2 Peter/Jude are combined to form the 2 semester hour course called "General Epistles"). Courses taught by resident faculty contain multiples of 10 clock hours of classroom activity. Topics taught by adjunct faculty have an additional 30 minutes for testing added to each 10 clock hours of instruction.

Course Descriptions

BIBL145A Romans

Romans is the classic treatise on justification by faith. Students will be able to use select verses from Romans in soul winning. Emphasis is placed on Israel's relationship to the Church. Students will also recognize the practical results of justification in Christian life and service.

30 clock hours

BIBL160 General Epistles

The student will study either 1 Peter or 2 Peter/Jude plus James and Hebrews. 1 Peter reveals the heart of Peter and exhorts believers to endure in the Christian life. 2 Peter and Jude emphasize the dangers of personal and corporate apostasy. James is a personal challenge to a pure Christian life. Hebrews is a masterful explanation of the superiority of Christ as taught in light of the background of the book of Leviticus. The New Covenant is a major emphasis.

31.5 clock hours

BIBL167 Daniel & Revelation

Daniel: Many of the foundations of Dispensationalism can be traced to this book. Special attention is devoted to the role of a strong testimony in a decadent society.

Revelation: The signs and symbols of this prophetic book are presented within a dispensational framework.

31.5 clock hours

BIBL170 Old Testament Exposition I

Genesis 1-11: Ten lectures will place special emphasis on the literal interpretation of Genesis 1-11. Students are introduced to the four key events of early human history: Creation, The Fall, The Flood and The Tower of Babel.

Ezra: Ten lectures will be spent examining the spiritual leadership principles found in Ezra.

Leviticus: In ten lectures a thorough description of the Old Testament sacrificial system and religious practices connected with the holy days is presented.

Judges: Judges may be substituted for Ezra some years. In the Book of Judges, the spiritual decline of Israel under the judges is noted.

31.5 clock hours

BIBL171 Old Testament Exposition II

Ecclesiastes: Ten lectures will be spent examining a piece of Old Testament wisdom literature which provides surprisingly contemporary evaluations of the cycles of life and the futility of living apart from the divine point of view.

Creation Seminar: Ten lectures will be spent studying the Biblical and scientific foundations for a creationist view of origins.

Ezra: Some years Ezra will be substituted for the Creation Seminar. Ten lectures will be spent examining the spiritual leadership principles found in Ezra.

Proverbs: The student is introduced to Old Testament wisdom literature in ten lectures. Proverbs is a source of practical, relevant wisdom for everyday life and interpersonal relationships.

31.5 clock hours

BIBL172 New Testament Exposition I

Acts: In twenty lectures the start of the Church is traced with the problems and solutions in the early church emphasized.

1 Corinthians: Ten lectures are devoted to this epistle which addresses several problem areas for the church. Paul's view on the proper use of spiritual gifts is a major emphasis.

31.5 clock hours

BIBL175 Gospels Exposition

The student will study Matthew for twenty lectures and then either ten lectures in John or the Passion Week of the Life of Christ. In Matthew, the Life and Ministry of Christ is studied from the Jewish perspective. In John, the Life of Christ will be presented with an emphasis on why John expected Jews and Gentiles to believe in Jesus of Nazareth. In the Passion Week, ten class sessions will cover the events of the last week of the Life of Christ. Background and calendar issues will be discussed. The physical, social, and spiritual suffering of Christ will be analyzed leading to a renewed appreciation of Christ's love for us.

31.5 clock hours

BIBL180 Pastoral Epistles & Counseling

Pastoral Epistles: In twenty lectures, 1 and 2 Timothy and Titus are taught with the goal of showing the exegetical basis for church organization and function. Special emphasis is placed on the qualifications for elders and deacons.

Introduction to Biblical Counseling: Ten lectures will be invested developing a Biblical basis for counseling and giving guidance in the counseling process. The Nouthetic model of Biblical Counseling is explained and promoted.

31.5 clock hours

BIBL185 Pauline Epistles

Galatians: Ten lectures are devoted to this Epistle which provides warnings against the dangers of mixing works with grace, and challenges believers to godly Christian living through the power of the indwelling Spirit.

1 Corinthians: Ten lectures are devoted to this Epistle which addresses several problem areas for the Church. Paul's view on the proper use of spiritual gifts is a major emphasis.

Philippians: Ten lectures are devoted to this Epistle which is a word of encouragement and comfort expressing how believers can pattern their thinking and behavior after Jesus Christ and find lasting joy and contentment.

31.5 clock hours

BIBL270 Old Testament Exposition III

Genesis 12-50: Ten lectures will be invested developing God's dealings with Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and Joseph.

Nehemiah: The student is introduced to the last historical book of the Old Testament. The godly life and leadership ability of Nehemiah is emphasized in ten lectures.

Zechariah: The motivational aspects of rebuilding the Temple will be the background for the fantastic visions of Judah's future in ten lectures.

31.5 clock hours

BIBL275 New Testament Exposition

1, 2, 3 John: These books have been chosen for their contribution to practical Christian living. There will be a detailed exposition of these timely Epistles. The students will be taken verse by verse through the three books.

2 Corinthians: Ten lectures will be spent evaluating the Christian's life and ministry principles in this Epistle from the Apostle Paul.

1 and 2 Thessalonians: Twenty-five lectures will be invested in the exposition of 1 and 2 Thessalonians, a valuable study because of the debate over the pretribulational rapture theory. The two epistles also have many practical exhortations for successful church services and the Christian life.

46 clock hours

BSHG103 New Testament Survey

This course conducts an overview of the Bible from Matthew to Revelation. Pertinent background and introductory material is covered. The theme and main teaching of each book are considered. The particular contribution of each book to the Canon is noted. Time permitting, difficult or vital passages of each book are explained.

45 clock hours

BSHG104 Old Testament Survey

This course conducts an overview of the Bible from Genesis to Malachi. Pertinent background and introductory material is covered. The theme and main teaching of each book are considered. The particular contribution of each book to the Canon is noted. Time permitting, difficult or vital passages of each book are explained.

45 clock hours

CHHI102 Church History

One week is given to tracing the conflict between God and Satan throughout human history. Two weeks are spent in providing the outline of church history. The student will gain an appreciation for the faithful personalities of the past, aspiring to learn more and become more like them.

31.5 clock hours

COMM201/202 Homiletics/Public Speaking

Male students will become familiar with the various types of sermons including the topical, textual and topical/textual. Expository preaching will be emphasized. The various parts of a sermon will be discussed. Female students will learn how to prepare Bible presentations for Sunday school classes, Ladies' Bible studies and other speaking opportunities. Both male and female students will prepare, and present orally, their own sermons/lessons.

30 clock hours

COMM208A Bible Study Methods

This course is designed to introduce the student to the basic principles of Biblical research. The various Bible study tools and methods will be taught. The skills learned in this course will be used in the Homiletics and Public Speaking courses.

30 clock hours

EVAN102 Personal Evangelism & Acts

Personal Evangelism: Ten lectures are provided by a prominent specialist in the field. Also included are three hours of supervised practical experience in actual evangelistic settings.

Acts: In twenty lectures the start of the Church is traced and the evangelistic techniques of the Apostles are emphasized.

31.5 clock hours

EVAN204 Evangelizing Monotheists

This course is designed to explore principles for evangelistic work among monotheists. Ten lectures will be devoted to each of the following: Jewish evangelism, Islamic evangelism, and evangelism among Roman Catholics.

31.5 clock hours

MIPR101 Ministry Practicum

The Ministry Practicum serves as the capstone to the first year academic experience by providing students with a supervised, concentrated ministry experience with an emphasis on evangelism and discipleship. The precise format of the Ministry Practicum varies between teaching sites, but in all cases, students are placed in real life ministry environments that provide multiple opportunities to apply what they have learned in the classroom throughout the year. In some cases, the Ministry Practicum may include additional training sessions.

MISS203 Missions Realities

Ten class lectures will include a general survey of the history of missions with special emphasis on the last 150 years and the student volunteer movement. Ten more class lectures will survey current issues in missions.

20.5 clock hours

MISS303 Missions Realities - International

This course and a 10-day international trip coordinated through the Word of Life International Ministries Department is designed to help prepare Word of Life Bible Institute sophomores for a life of service to the Lord. In addition, the course will prepare students for the task of evangelism and discipleship through a combination of classroom teaching and actual field experience. Assignments will include: creation of a prayer letter, church presentations, daily journal, 1000 word report, a ten-question missionary interview, and a performance evaluation completed by the staff member overseeing the trip.

100 clock hours

PHED101-102; 201-202 Physical Education I- IV

This course is designed to aid the student in gaining and maintaining good physical fitness and promote interaction of students through activities amid a Christian atmosphere. The program will be three-fold as the student will participate in the equivalent of eight physical education classes, personal aerobics workouts each week for thirteen weeks, and a quiz each semester.

15 hours per semester

PRTH104, 105, 204, 205 Christian Disciplines

A minimum of 225 hours each semester are spent in a variety of required activities designated to cultivate and mature each student in a godly fashion. Students must complete these components in each semester of their studies. Approximately 50% of the grade will be objective. The rest is subjective: evaluations by the Deans, Resident Assistants, other students and the student himself. The student is trained in the areas of quiet time, prayer, personal evangelism, testimonies, Sunday School lessons, and devotional talks. In the fall, the students are prepared for witnessing with weekend seminars by experienced evangelists. During the first half of the fall semester, the students are led on witnessing trips by the staff. The student body is then divided into several ministry groups: Choir, Open Air Evangelism, Local Church Ministries, Children's Ministry Teams, Spanish Outreaches, etc. This course provides a tool for the staff counselor and a measuring stick for the student to gauge his character as observed through the eyes of others. Included in these hours are quiet time (a personal time of intense Biblical reflection: 2.5 hours per week), devotions (observed recitation time: 1.5 hours per week), chapel (less formal lecture time addressing a wide range of current or pertinent issues: 2 hours per week), worship (structured services with student participation in various aspects of traditional worship services: 3 hours per week), work assignment (supervised training addressing market-place skills and attitudes: six to eight hours per week) and Scripture memory (recitation time testing the student's mastery of assigned verses).

225 clock hours per semester

PRTH216 Practical Theology I

Discipleship: Ten lectures will emphasize the need for and techniques of directive Biblical counseling. It will also demonstrate the importance of one-on-one discipleship. Models of discipleship will be studied with practical principles for discipleship in a local church structure.

Leadership: This series of ten lectures starts with an examination of Biblical leadership principles. These will be applied to people management, time management, and team building. The emphasis will be on how to develop esprit de corps, staff loyalty, cooperation, and positive attitudes for an atmosphere conducive to individual effort, creativity, and success.

Prayer: Ten lectures will be devoted to an exegetical and topical evaluation of the Bible's teaching on prayer.

31.5 clock hours

PRTH217A, B Practical Theology II

Organization and Administration of the Local Church: Ten lectures will be taught by a pastor who has firsthand knowledge of the structure, organization and operation of a local church. It will include a discussion of the role of pastors, elders, deacons, and lay leadership. The various departments of the local church will be described in relation to a chain of command and organizational chart. The relationship of the Christian day school to the youth program of the church will be considered. During these ten lectures, female students will separate for lectures on women's ministries. The women's lecturer will investigate the various ministry opportunities for women in the local church and in society. She will discuss the Biblical principles and practical steps to take to participate in these various ministries.

Church Planting: Ten lectures will be delivered by a successful church planter, considering all the steps necessary to start a local church in a community.

Counseling Youth: Ten lectures will emphasize counseling issues unique to young people and the Biblical principles that apply to those situations.
31.5 clock hours

PRTH 219 Spiritual Disciplines

Evangelistic Public Speaking: Ten lectures for both men and women on the design, delivery, and techniques of evangelistic public speaking.

Life Transitions: Ten lectures will be devoted to a consideration of the next steps in life for the student including discussions of choosing their next college and degree program, student aid, the consideration of seminary or graduate school, creating resumes, applying for jobs, establishing a routine that considers personal growth, family life, community life, ministry and employment.

Spiritual Gifts: In ten lectures students study how to identify and develop spiritual gifts.
31.5 clock hours

PRTH310 Youth Ministries or Missions Internship

This course consists of 40 hours of ministry per week for 10 weeks, a supervisor evaluation and a series of papers including the history/context of the ministry they are working with, the inner workings of the ministry and an evaluation of the ministry and the end of their internship.

THEO101 Theology I

This course includes Theology Proper, Bibliology, Anthropology, and Christology.
45 clock hours

THEO102 Theology II

This course includes Soteriology, Angelology, Pneumatology, Ecclesiology, and Eschatology.
46.5 clock hours

THEO211 Dispensationalism

The Christian philosophy of history will be discussed and the dispensational system of interpretation presented as the best way to understand God's program on Planet Earth, both for the "The Church" and "Israel."
30 clock hours

THEO212 Hermeneutics

This course deals extensively with the science and art of Biblical interpretation. It surveys the major schools of interpretation, including a historical study of their rise and influence on the church. There will also be discussions of theological methodology – how hermeneutical and exegetical considerations inform the development of systematic theology.
30 clock hours

THEO219 Apologetics & World Views

Apologetics: Twenty lectures will be invested in the Theology of Evangelism: How should we approach the secular mind with the claims of Christ? In this topic we will investigate the various models of Christian Apologetics: rational, semi-rational and presuppositional; concluding with support for the presuppositional approach. Various "rational" presentations will be considered for the sake of "pre-evangelism" such as: the historicity of Scriptures, Jesus Christ and His resurrection, prophecy and the law of averages, the contribution of archaeology.

Cults & World Religions: Twenty-six lectures will be invested in a study of the cults and world views youth workers may face while ministering with young people. This study will include Jehovah Witnesses, Mormonism, Moonies, Hare Krishna, the New Age Movement, and five lectures on the non-monotheistic World Religions.
46 clock hours

THEO220 Contemporary Issues

This course will deal with the "Issues" of the 21st century. Ten lectures will be dedicated to an analysis of the Charismatic Movement. Ten lectures will be dedicated to Postmodernism and the Emerging Church. These lectures are

designed as an introductory study of Postmodernism and some of its cultural, social, moral, and spiritual implications. The working hypothesis of the course is that the postmodern thinking presents new cultural, social, moral and spiritual challenges for the Christian. These lectures examine the development of Postmodernism and its logical conclusions. They will especially focus on the theory of Moral Relativism. These lectures will also examine the nature and the challenges of the emergent church movement which is heavily influenced by postmodern culture. A final ten lectures will be spent discussing the history of fundamentalism, liberalism, neo-orthodoxy and neo-evangelicalism. Also discussed will be: abortion, sexual addictions, divorce and remarriage, the KJV debate, interracial marriages, the role of women in the church, the Christian and social responsibility, pacifism, and Christian standards.

31.5 clock hours

YTHC213 Youth Work

Thirty lectures from the following potential topics will be combined for this course.

Biblical Philosophy of Ministry: Ten lectures are devoted to examining how to develop a Biblical approach to ministry. The student will see how verses from Colossians are put into a format for a philosophy of ministry. Responsibilities of youth leaders, teens and the program will also be looked at during class. The Word of Life Local Church Ministry objectives will be discussed as well as other youth work philosophies.

History of Christian Education: Ten lectures provide an overview of the historical development of Christian Education.

Children's Ministries: Ten lectures provide insight into the learning styles and learning needs of children at various stages of development.

31.5 clock hours

YTHC214 Marriage, Family & the Home

Christian Manhood/Womanhood: Ten lectures will be in split sessions with the men studying "The Man of God" and the women studying "The Woman of God."

Marriage and Family: Ten lectures will be invested in a discussion of the Biblical standards for marriage and family life.

Personal Finances: Ten lectures prepare the student for creating a personal budget and managing their finances with a view to the special needs of full-time Christian workers, particularly those who raise support.

31.5 clock hours

In addition to Academic Courses, a variety of enrichment opportunities are required for graduation from Word of Life Bible Institute.

Exposition Seminar

At least twenty-one hours of lectures are delivered by established leaders in the field of Bible Exposition over the opening weekend of the first semester as well as the Missions Conference and Founders Conference weekends. Themes for these seminars vary from year to year as do the lecturers.

21 clock hours

Electives

Additional courses which may be offered for students who are doing well academically include the following:

Admissions Requirements

1. Each applicant must be at least 17 years of age on the day of registration.
2. Since the Bible Institute is a postsecondary institution, each applicant must be a high school graduate or have obtained a GED Diploma or have met the requirements of province, state, or country regarding high school completion.
3. Transcripts are required for all secondary and postsecondary education.
4. Each applicant must be in agreement with Word of Life's Statement of Faith and signify a willingness to abide by its Standard of Conduct.
5. Each applicant must give testimony to being born again and indicate a sincere desire to study the Word of God.
6. Each applicant must be able to read, write and communicate in English. If English is not your first language you must pass the TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language) or attend one of Word of Life's SYME (School of Youth Ministries in English) programs for a minimum of 4 months. SYME programs are located in Korea, Japan and Taiwan currently.

Note: Once a student has been accepted to Word of Life Bible Institute or one of its teaching sites, transfer of that acceptance to another teaching site must be approved through the Word of Life Bible Institute Admissions Office.

Notice of Nondiscriminatory Policy as to Students

The Word of Life Bible Institute admits students of any sex, race, color, or national and ethnic origin to all the rights, privileges, programs, and activities generally accorded or made available to students at the Institute. International Student Admissions

1. Complete and return the application, autobiography, and two reference forms. The Bible Institute teaching site in Canada cannot issue an acceptance letter without this information.
2. Each applicant must be able to read, write and communicate in English. If English is not your first language you must pass the TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language) with a 61 or better on the internet based test. Students who have attended one of Word of Life's SYME programs must pass the MPT (Michigan Placement Test) with a score of 81 (with 4 months completed), 71 (with 6 months completed) or 61 (with 8 months completed) to attend.
3. Submit high school and any postsecondary transcripts. The Bible Institute may request a certified translation of such transcripts.
4. Provide proof of health insurance for the time you will be a student.
5. Submit funds to be held on deposit for tuition, room and board, and return transportation. Additionally, provide evidence of sufficient funds or financial support to pay incidental expenses.
6. Obtain a study permit from the Canadian Consulate. A U.S. citizen may obtain a student visa at the port of entry, but check with the port of entry to determine the hours when immigration offices are open. See the Canadian government's website at www.cic.gc.ca for up-to-date details. An applicant will need to provide the Canadian government with the following:
 - A. An acceptance letter from the Bible Institute's Owen Sound extension
 - B. Proof of health insurance
 - C. Evidence of sufficient funds or financial support to pay for the year at the Bible Institute which may be a letter from the Bible Institute certifying that the funds are already on deposit

Transferring to Other Schools

Depending on the anticipated course of study and academic record, up to one year of credit may be granted by most Christian colleges for studies at the Bible Institute's Owen Sound extension. Among the schools granting credit for coursework at Word of Life are:
